Continuing Research

In the last issue (Vol. XI, No. 1), we itemized several themes which direct our work going forward: U.S. History; Generations and their use; U.S. Interior; Families, and Technology. These may shuffle as bit as we change focus over time. However, we want to provide more information in several areas.



With respect to the U.S. Interior, we saw a map that had been developed for history teachers. It showed the land partitions, who controlled the land prior to its access by the U.S., and some dates. The title was "Growth of the United States 1783-1853." That timeframe is from the end of the U.S. Revolution to the troubled times prior to the U.S. Civil War. Along with the map, there is a list of posts on the themes. In a later post, we use the Yellowstone which is a TV series to look further at New England influences in the west.

The subject of Harvard is always topical. For instance, how families relate to the institution can be a subject of study. Also, given the season's link to Charles Dickens, we consider his first visit to the U.S. in 1842. He liked Boston and Harvard and made it as far west as St. Louis which featured in the western expansion. However, the traveling was arduous so he did not venture further though he talked of the prairie. See the Charles Dickens post for links to his writings about his impressions of America.
