

## 2025, 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter

We have technology as a focus which is multi-faceted. A lot of the current attention seems to be on the computational side of things, in particular the three-year experience with GenAI/LLM where its boons and banes became known. Later, he was appointed by General Washington to head the Continental Army. In that role, he launched the [Southern Campaign](#) that resulted in the defeat of Lord Cornwallis and provided an end to the conflict. Nathanael was born in Rhode Island into a Quaker family and will be featured over the next few years.

## 2025, 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter

While the 250<sup>th</sup> may allow a look at the details of the Revolution which was of several years of duration, we must look back [with care to families and their histories](#). The training ground for the officers of the Revolution was the French-Indian affair. After seeing a plaque in a park in Virginia, we have to look at the land of [Lord Fairfax](#) and its roles in the Revolution, besides giving us General Washington.
